In house programming	Yes, regular meetings and treatment	Many include curfews and regular meetings. Enrollment in school or employment is sometimes provided.
Applicable Federal Laws	Protected by Americans with Disabilities Act and Fair Housing Act	Protected by Americans with Disabilities Act and Fair Housing Act

Locally, zoning codes are assigned to halfway homes and three-quarter homes on a case-by-case basis. There is "no one-to-one" match between these facilities and zoning use codes.
